City of Clearwater Fleet Places Fifth in Nation

It takes a lot of grit, grime and knowledge to keep Clearwater's robust fleet operating at the highest level. The city's fleet team gets the job done each and every day. And national agencies continue to take notice.

For the fifth year in a row, **Clearwater's Fleet Division** continues to be

recognized as one of the "100 Best Fleets in North America," this time ranking fifth in the nation out of 38,000 public fleets. The award was sponsored by the National Association of Fleet Administrator's 100 Best Fleets in the Americas and Governing Magazine.

"They're not just mechanics," said Perry Conzen, the city's fleet manager, of his team of more than 30 people. "They're technicians. Whether it be a fire truck, police car, garbage truck or mower, there's a lot more knowledge that's required in the pursuit of this work, versus years ago."

The Fleet Division repairs and maintains the city's fleet of approximately 1,800 city vehicles and equipment. This includes vehicles and equipment for Clearwater Police, Clearwater Fire & Rescue, Clearwater Solid Waste/Recycling, Clearwater Gas and Parks & Recreation. The fleet includes police cars, fire engines, pickup trucks, dump trucks, solid waste trucks, rescue vehicles, back hoes, loaders, trailers,

trenchers, and small equipment, such as lawn mowers and plate compacters.

The 74,000-square-foot fleet shop is all under one roof and includes many divisions: Fire Department/ Heavy Equipment, Police, Solid Waste, Medium Duty, and a small-engine shop. A lot can be happening at the same time between the different locations.

Annual Records Destruction

Were you aware that the city has a records storage facility? It is 4,000 square feet, managed by the **City Clerk**'s office, and is housed within the city's Category 5 hurricane-rated gas facility. This is the retirement place for paper documents and microfilm to wait out their state-mandated retention periods. Until then, they are ready and available for legal review, audit, public request and digitization. Annually, once records have met their retention requirements, they are purged and destroyed. In recent years, the **Solid Waste Department** has provided the sweat, muscle and equipment needed to pull this off. June 2022 brought the biggest records purge to date, tackling 950 boxes of paper that weighed 24,000 pounds, divided among eight handlers and two drivers. That equates to roughly 1,000 pounds per person, per hour, spent loading and wheeling carts from the second floor.

The team included **Bryant Johnson, Tyrone Austin, Feth Benbelgacem, Eric Climes, Tiffany Collins, Sherrick Cuffie, Robert Reed, Erick Towns, Markise Wingfield, Edwin Martinez,** and **Rick Ottinger.** Honorable mentions go to **Earl Gloster** and **Mark Beery**.

The city is making strides to reduce paper records and move to electronic where possible. Some existing paper records have retentions of 50 years, and the digitization of long-term and permanent records leaves a paper trail. The Solid Waste Department will continue to play a key role in recycling these records when possible.

Due to the volume this year, it was decided to use the Pinellas County Incinerator, which is a waste-to-energy resource recovery facility, for the supervised confidential portion of disposal.

- It uses waste to produce 75 megawatts of electricity 24/7, enough to power 41,000 homes for a year.
- It also recovers 25,900 tons of metal for recycling annually, enough to build 20,000 cars.

Team Made of Up of Staff from Several City Departments Tackles Transient Camp Cleanup

Parks & Recreation, with assistance from Stormwater, Planning & Development, Solid Waste & Recycling, Public Utilities, Marine & Aviation, Traffic Engineering, Clearwater Police and the Homeless Outreach Program partnered to clean multiple large transient camps that had occupied city green spaces along creeks and trails.

After code enforcement officers saw the transient camps, Homeless

Outreach and Directions for Living representatives offered alternative housing options and offered resources such as gas, transportation passes, food and more.

At the first location near Stephenson's Creek, Traffic and Engineering and the Clearwater Police Department assisted with closing the road while Parks & Recreation operated heavy equipment to remove more than 60



yards of trash. Not only did the camp's location make it difficult to clean, but it also made it an environmental hazard. Debris was spilling into the creek each night when the tide would rise. Parks & Recreation employees also removed many invasive plant



species, such as Brazilian pepper trees. Overall, the cleanup took four hours.

The second location covered almost two acres of land behind the Clearwater Solid Waste Transfer Station. The wetland area was too unstable for Parks & Recreation heavy equipment vehicles to navigate through naturally, so they built a temporary bridge using concrete blocks.

The competition consists of a written safety test, a Commercial Driver's License vehicle "pre-trip" inspection, and an obstacle course. For the obstacle course portion, drivers must perform an off-set driving maneuver, a right-hand turn through cones, parallel park their truck, back into an alley dock, drive through a serpentine course forward and backward, put their passenger side tires through two rows of tennis balls set 30 inches apart (rear tandem tires are 24 inches), and finish on a stop line as close as possible without going over the line.

The first and second place finishers will compete at the international road-e-o competition, which will be held Oct. 14-15, in El Paso, Texas. (SWANA Florida pays for competitors' airfare and hotel.) Congratulations!

Meet New Clearwater Police K-9 Named Krys

The **Clearwater Police Department** has a new four-legged crime fighter working for the agency. **Krys**, and his two-legged partner, **Officer Adrian Kwiatkowski**, graduated from K-9 school together in April at Pinellas Park High School, alongside dogs and law enforcement officers from other surrounding agencies. K-9 school runs 16 weeks and is designed to teach the dogs and handlers how to work together as a team.

Krys is a little over a year and a half old. His passport from Hungary says he is a German shepherd, but it's believed he also has some Belgian Malinois in him. His talents include jumping over really high obstacles and finding items for which he is searching. At home, he likes to relax and play with another family dog.

The police department now has five K-9s on its team, which is led by Sgt. **Rob Main**. All of the K-9s live with their handlers in addition to working alongside them.
